Blink and you miss them.

For the second year running, holiday makers flocking to Bass Coast have been welcomed by signs calling for the cessation of sand mine expansion and promoting natural assets rather than being 'Melbourne's Quarry'.

A Save Western Port Woodlands crew was on the road early on Boxing Day erecting signs along a 20 kilometre stretch of the Bass Highway.

The hand-painted signs were designed to alert the travellers to the threat posed by sand mining and the number of mines that are hardly hidden behind a thin veneer of vegetation.

The signs didn't please everyone. By next morning they were mostly gone. Clearly the message hit a nerve.

"It was a massive effort to get the signs up. We like to think it was even harder to remove them in the dead of night." said Catherine Watson, spokesperson for the group.

"We reached our target audience, we Informed them about the extent of the sand mines and we gained many supporters."

"If they keep tearing the signs down, we'll keep putting more up."



Circle Work at the Lang Lang Proving Ground



VinFast reportedly paid \$36 million for the Holden Proving ground. They had big plans for the local market as well as the U.S. Last November they decided to ditch the local operation and set up offices and factories in California, U.S.A.

VinFast cited COVID19 as the reason as it is now too difficult for engineers to commute between countries.

The Lang Lang Proving Ground is once again on the market and, given the number of local jobs and environmental assets behind that fence many people are waiting to see who shows an interest and what happens next.

Bass Coast Shire Council (BCSC) has expressed disappointment at this turn of events. The BCSC website states that

"We (BCSC) were disappointed to be advised that Vinfast is exiting operations in Australia, impacting on its vehicle testing operation in Lang Lang. The decision will directly impact the 48 permanent and 10 casual staff employed at the Lang Lang facility.

"We (BCSC) are working with the Federal Government regarding worker transition support for the existing workforce. The loss of another operator at the facility will have significant impacts on the local economy with the current operation contributing approximately \$30 million in economic output each year.

"The 877-hectare site was first opened in 1957 by Holden and includes 44km of sealed and unsealed test roads, skidpan, high-speed circular track, emissions testing facility, vehicle workshops and laboratories. There is extensive native vegetation onsite and Council is aware of the community interest to protect the environmental significance of the site.

"The site was listed in 2021 for sale via an expression of interest campaign. We are in the process of determining our approach to the site, balancing the needs of community, environment and our economy."



MOW, MOW, MOW YOUR GRASS

Grow, grow, grow! High rainfall and warm temperatures have lead to perfect growing conditions. While this is great for our local farmers, it means that property owners need to be vigilant to keep up maintenance, especially coming into the summer bushfire season.

Bass Coast Shire Council is currently carrying out long grass inspections which will continue into the new year.

Under Council's Local Law No. 1 Neighbourhood Amenity 2012, property owners need to maintain grass to a height under 30 centimetres, remove or spray weeds, such as blackberries, clear overhanging branches and grass obstructing footpaths and maintain any other vegetation, such as shrubs and trees.

Infringement notices may be issued if these requirements are not being met.

From 1 January 2022, if Officers

deem a property to be unsightly, the owner will be issued with an infringement of \$300, as well as a letter of Notice to Comply within 21 days.

Further infringements may be issued, if the conditions of a Notice to Comply are not met within the required timeframe.

Additionally, under Section 117 of the *Local Government Act 2020*, an authorised officer may proceed to have any required work carried out, in which case, the property owner will be liable for the cost of such works in addition to any penalty imposed.

A COOK'S JOURNAL with JAN CHESHIRE



RHUBARB SOUR CREAM CAKE

WE GROW too much rhubarb!! I recently asked Bert to cut the rhubarb back a bit as I can't keep up with it. So of course I got myself a load of rhubarb. However, this lovely cake was so delicious that I didn't complain too much. Try it and see.

Ingredients

125 grams of butter, softened

220 grams of brown sugar

Zest of 1 orange

2 eggs

225 grams of self-raising flour, sifted

75 grams of plain flour, sifted

1 teaspoon of ground cinnamon

300 grams of sour cream

300 grams of rhubarb, trimmed, cut into 2cm lengths

2-3 stalks of rhubarb, extra, trimmed, cut into 4cm lengths

1 tablespoon of raw sugar

Icing sugar, to dust

Cream or custard to serve

Method

1/Preheat oven to 160C.

2/Beat the butter, brown sugar and orange zest in a bowl for 5 minutes or until pale and fluffy

3/Add the eggs, 1 at a time, beating well after each addition

4/Use a large metal spoon to fold in the combined flour, cinnamon and sour cream in alternating batches.

5/Gently stir in the rhubarb.

6/Spoon into the prepared pan and smooth the surface.

7/Arrange the extra rhubarb on top and sprinkle with raw sugar

8/Bake for 1 hour 15 mins or until a skewer inserted into the centre of the cake comes out clean.

9/Set aside in the pan for 10 minutes to cool

10/Release the cake from the pan and transfer to a wire rack to cool completely.

11/Dust with icing sugar and serve with thick cream or custard.

JAZZ with Jason Adams

The Shape of Jazz to Come: Yes it was

Few figures in jazz have been as polarising as Ornette Coleman, the somewhat enigmatic alto saxophonist (and trumpeter and violinist) who influenced jazz of the 1960s and beyone. His approach was unique, pioneering what became known as "free jazz", i.e. jazz that did not follow a designated chord progression. Unlike many other free jazz exponents, however, Coleman always maintained the balance between rhythm, harmony and melody, and built his own music out of the rich traditions of jazz.

His recordings for Atlantic in the late 1950s and early 1960s, were among his best and most influential, and the first of these was *The Shape of Jazz to Come*, recorded on 22/05/59 (yes, another great album from that year). It featured Coleman (alto saxophone) and his main collaborators during this important period, Don Cherry (cornet), Charlie Haden (bass) and Billy Higgins (drums).

Track one is "Lonely Woman", which is suitably melancholy. Haden and Higgins provide a brief introduction before Coleman and Cherry play the theme. Coleman then solos, shifting his tone and feel, as if in a conversation, swinging at times, bluesy at others. Cherry provides a few comments of his own during the solo, then the theme is restated before Haden and Higgins take the track out.

"Eventually" is next, and the influence of Charlie Parker on Coleman's music is on display. This uptempo number is like a twisted be-bop classic – fast, furious and surprising. Haden and Higgins provide the anchor (at speed) and Coelman's solo is a flurry of cohesive ideas. Cherry then solos and shows off his complementary style to full effect, making use of the fast tempo to create lots of space in his solo. The melody is then restated, and bam – it's over.

The third track is "Peace" and the horns state the melody, once again. Haden is also prominent in this soulful opening (Higgins does not play on this track at all). Coleman then solos with Haden accompanying. Coleman's solo is beautiful and melodic, and (with the benefit of sixty plus years' hindsight) his influence on jazz is there for all to hear. Cherry then solos and maintains the quiet, contemplative feel. "Peace" proves the capacity of this group, under Coleman's leadership, to create a thoroughly coherent, musical and logical composition in the absence of the traditional chord progression. This is rightly the featured track of the album as it is an outstanding example of what Coleman's music at this time was all about.

"Focus on Sanity" is track four. The melody is stated briefly, and is really just one phrase. Then Haden solos with Higgins accompanying. Haden has time to explore different ideas, and his solo is quite contemplative. Higgins dovetails his playing with Haden perfectly. Coleman then solos briefly and shifts gear, playing quite frenetically. Cherry solos next and shifts the feel again, playing in a much more relaxed, swinging style. Higgins then gets a chance to show off his soloing credentials and delivers a well constructed solo with great musicality. The melody/phrase is then stated and the piece is over.

The fifth track is "Congeniality" and the melody is at an easy (congenial?) tempo, but shifts feel between something *like* swing and something *like* bop. Despite its easy feel, the melody is deceptively difficult to play, and the ensemble play it beautifully.

Coleman solos first and he swings throughout, but with an edge to his playing. As with all the tracks on this album, Parker's influence is clear, but Coleman has his own style and a unique tone. Cherry then solos, and makes the most of the cornet's traditional sound, as at times his playing sounds like it's from an earlier period. Again, the two solos complement each other perfectly. The melody is then restated to take the piece out.

The final track is "Chronology" and the influence of Parker and be-bop more generally can be heard in the melody. Cherry solos first and produces another well-crafted offering, pushing the cornet's tonal palette more than in previous solos. Coleman solos next and as usual ups the intensity. Haden walks in support throughout, and Higgins provides just the right accompaniment, playing with great subtlety.

The arranging and instrumentation of all these tracks is largely traditional. The jazz traditions drawn upon by the players are easily identified too, be it the blues or swing or the innovations of be-bop. The notes selected by the soloists weren't necessarily that controversial either – no shrieks, howls or deliberate dissonance (let alone atonalism) can be heard. Yet despite all this, the playing was fresh, new, challenging and definitely innovative.

And re-listening to *The Shape of Jazz to Come*, (especially if you haven't done so for some time) will remind you of just how influential this approach to jazz would for decades to come.

COP1 Coronet Bay

The walking track near Norsemans Road can be a mystical place in the early morning light.

For if you watch the rain gently filtering through the overhanging leaves and pause to breathe in the air from Western Port accompanied by the sounds of its waters, this is the place to be. This is nature at its best.

It was Wednesday the 10th of November 2021 and while significant environmental events were unfolding at Glasgow, twenty or so local environmentalists, garbed in various forms of wet weather gear, broke the silence - they had come to plant 700 native grasses, eucalyptus and banksia seedlings along the border between the planned Coastal Estates housing development area and the walking track.

Over time, the area had deteriorated and become a muddy swamp.

But thanks to the Coronet Bay Ratepayers and Residents Association (CBRRA) and their dedicated team, they had set up a working relationship with Coastal Estates to progressively rehabilitate the area.

Sponsored by Coastal Estates, the Bass Valley Landcare Group had grown a mixture of plants to be transplanted into what is known as the Banksia Grove, south of Norsemans Road.

"The aim of the project", said Angela a CBRRA representative, "is to increase the biodiversity of the habitat, provide a buffer between the estate and the remanent vegetation along the foreshore track, and for it to become a refuge for wildlife to move along the foreshore corridor."

Those who took part in the planting, including some associated with the Corinella Foreshore Reserve Committee and two Landcare officers, will help the local residents carry out various maintenance activities to ensure the grove becomes and remains an environmental sanctuary for all.

As I had not come fully prepared for the wet weather, I headed for shelter leaving the slightly damp, but very enthusiastic planters to finish the task.

As they 'planted away', they assured me they would be back, for the task is only just beginning.

I left, feeling they had created their own Conference of the Parties (COP) and taken the opportunity to play a part in preserving what's left of this the ever so important, Coronet Bay biosphere.

I'm sure COP2 Coronet Bay, is already being planned.

Bedtime Stories

MY TWO daughters came down to catch up for Christmas and the New Year, a sort of two-for-the-price-of-one visit. I'm not that comfortable with the "came down" phrase. Seems a bit of a putdown in some way for us country dwellers but then we do travel "up" to the city. That's if you are nuts enough to want to go there in the first place. And you can't travel "up" both ways so one of us has to give way.

Anyway, somewhere during their visit we got around to talking books or to be more precise we talked about reading. When they were young, bedtime reading was essential if peace was to reign of an evening. I was reminded that many evenings were not readings as such but telling stories constructed on the spot. It's easy to get away with that if your audience is only four or five years old. I seem to remember my Freddy the Fish was a best seller in its time.

When I was that young, my burning ambition was to be able to read solo so I no longer had to rely on others. I know my desire for such an achievement was greater than when I reached the driving licence year.

Now one daughter is a librarian and a lover of books of all genres while the other in her busy family and professional life confesses to reading one book a year. I think even that is stretching it a bit. Did I succeed with one and fail with the other in the art of storytelling? They say emphatically no, they treasure the memories of those times, they just put different values on the long-term outcomes. I also hold those memories dear so that's just fine with me.

After they had left, I began to ponder on those days long gone and got to thinking about the nature of love in all its many guises. My love for these two middling-aged women is so far removed from the love I had for those two little girls.

So different that I cannot put it into words but I think they know and understand.

It is strange how so many men shy away from the love word as if it were a finite commodity to be carefully rationed out. Perhaps some see it as an admission of weakness. In part, that may be because we get such little exposure to the concept of love, especially from our daily papers and TV news. 
